This policy replaces the Humanix Cookie Policy dated 11 June 2026, Version 1.0, in full. That file was reissued on 30 June 2026 with the pagination changed and the wording untouched, but the cover block still said 11 June, Version 1.0. This version corrects the record.

1. Who this is from

Humanix Ltd, a company registered in the Republic of Cyprus with registration number HE 496907, whose registered office is at Omonoias, 52, Troodos Court, 1st floor, Flat/Office 3, 3052, Limassol, Cyprus.

2. What a cookie is

A cookie is a small file a website stores on your device. It lets the site recognise your browser between one page and the next, which is how you stay logged in when you move around.

The same rules apply to anything else stored on or read from your device, whether or not it is technically a cookie. This policy covers all of it.

3. What we use

We use strictly necessary storage only. There are no advertising cookies on humanix.me, no analytics cookies and no third-party tracking cookies.

The table below was read off the running site rather than written from a template, so it says what humanix.me actually sets and nothing else.

That is the only cookie the site sets. We do not keep you signed in with a cookie. Your sign-in tokens are held in your own browser's local storage under the names `humanix.access` and `humanix.refresh`, and the sign-up flow keeps what it needs in session storage under `humanix.onboarding`. Both are cleared when you sign out, and session storage is cleared when you close the tab. We mention them here because they do the job people expect a cookie to do, and because you should know they are there even though the law about cookies treats them separately.

Where you sign in through Google, Google sets cookies of its own on its own domains and its policy governs those.

None of this needs your consent, because the site cannot work without it. If you block it, you cannot sign in. This applies to the table above and to the browser storage described with it. It does not apply to the interaction signals in section 4, which are a separate matter and are covered there.

4. Signals we record while you use the platform

While you are writing a contribution, the platform records the rhythm of your typing, the timing and pattern of pointer movement and scrolling, paste events, and attributes of your browser and device. We call these interaction signals. We use them for two things: to check that a person rather than a machine is writing, and as an input to the score that decides whether we accept a contribution and how much we record as owed to you.

The second purpose has a financial consequence for you, which is why this is set out here and not folded into the security paragraph. Where we receive no interaction signals at all, a contribution is scored in a lower band by default, which usually means less money and sometimes means no acceptance.

We keep the raw signals for the period set out in section 8 of our Privacy Policy and then keep only the derived score. We do not build a stored profile of how you personally type, and we do not use these signals to infer anything about your emotional or psychological state.

Section 3.2 and section 5 of our Privacy Policy set out the rest of it, including how to ask us to look again at a decision the score produces.

5. Controlling what is stored

Every browser lets you see the cookies a site has stored, delete them, and refuse new ones. The setting is usually under privacy or security. If you block strictly necessary cookies for humanix.me, you will not be able to log in or contribute.

Deleting cookies does not delete your account, and it does not affect anything we have recorded as owed to you.

6. Changes to this policy

We will publish a new version here when this one changes, with a new version number and a new effective date. Every version we have published is kept and available on request.
